PROGRAMME NOTE

CoisCéim is dedicated to the production of new dance works, Crash Ensemble to new contemporary music and Fishamble to new dramatic works. The companies thus share an ethos: the commitment to the new, and the members of each company have long admired each other's work. Dance, music, drama: they seemed a natural fit and so, around five years ago, the three companies came together for Culture Night with each producing a short, stand–alone. Audiences seemed to really enjoy the chance to sample all three art forms in a single evening.

It seemed natural to take the next step of working together on a single project. The idea came from David Bolger, artistic director of CoisCéim, and was not so much, 'Eileen Gray' as 'who is this Eileen Gray?' which is not to say that she was unheard of, but rather that in a relatively short space of time she seemed to have moved from almost having become 'a ghost in my own lifetime' to being a major figure in design, art and architecture, celebrated across Europe and more recently in Ireland. If nothing else, who was this person who designed the most expensive chair ever sold at auction? Further, who was she as a

person? She was said to be immensely private and yet she was capable of walking the streets of Paris with her lover, the chanteuse Damia, and their pet panther. The immense scale and prodigious output of her life with a range of interests from the unique objects of high bourgeoisie culture to the needs of the French holiday camper – and more than anything the interest in life as it is actually lived – meant that there was an almost endlessly rich source of material from which to work.

Galway International Arts Festival joined the three companies as a partner for the work and to provide it with its first home.

A series of workshop were arranged, housed by CoisCéim, and performers in dance, music and drama came together to try out exercises to see what could be created. At this point the whole project might have been killed by kindness ("you go first", "by no means", "no you", "no... after you") so it was decided that different sessions would be actively lead by different artists, still involving all three disciplines, but each having a go at creating something without negative comment sure in the knowledge that things which didn't work could be quietly abandoned

later. It was agreed that the fact that Eileen Gray designed from the natural movement of the person outwards: in her carpets, her chairs and with most conspicuous success in her house in the South of France E1027, was important and somehow should be embodied in the work. It was also agreed that to the question 'who is this Eileen Gray' could be added 'and why did so many people want something from her'?

Based on moments and ideas from the workshops, the composition of the music, by Deirdre Gribbon, came next and reflects the spirit of the age of decorative art in Paris in the 1920s–1930s. It embodies Eileen's spirit of self-discovery reflecting transformations through her life from Edwardian Irish aristocrat to emancipated pioneering Parisian artist who had a pilot's license and drove a motorcycle.

The work evolved into a document shared between the companies and the drama started to develop into key moments, collisions with various characters and reimagined turning points in the life of Eileen Gray from the Paris of the 1920s to the E1027 house in the South of France to older age in Paris of the 1970s. The lodestone for writer Gavin Kostick is the

quote given at the head of the note which he felt obliged him to attempt to be of our time as she was of hers. The obligation is not so much as to be accurate as to be brave.

The choreography, by David Bolger, has continued to be formed during rehearsals and looks at the decorative functionality of the work and explores feelings, for example as simple as what it feels like to sit in one of her chairs through how a person might move through her architectural spaces, the combination of form and flow, and the emotional context of the work: for her as an individual and for us as we experience it.

As the whole show is about such an influential figure as Eileen Gray, the set and costume design, by Maree Kearns, with lighting by Sinead McKenna are absolutely integral to the project.

The title *Invitation* to a *Journey* is from the title of the Baudelaire poem, *L'invitation* au voyage, which was written on the wall of the E1027 house, and part of which is freely adapted as part of the script of the play.

A Festival of Extraordinary Experiences

Founded in 1978 Galway International Arts Festival is one of Europe's leading international arts festivals and celebrates the very best of the performing and visual arts from Ireland and around the world. The Festival takes place each July in Galway, Ireland with an annual attendance of 200,000.

In recent years the Festival has begun touring its own productions and exhibitions nationally and internationally.

The world premieres of Arlington [a love story] by Enda Walsh a Landmark Productions and Galway International Arts Festival coproduction; Kitchen a short text by Enda Walsh; and Death at Intervals by Kellie Hughes a Festival coproduction with Kellie Hughes all premiere at GIAF 2016.

TheEmergencyRoom and Galway International Arts Festival's production of riverrun, in association with Cusack Projects, written, performed and directed by Olwen Fouéré, premiered in Galway in 2013, and toured to Dublin, London, Edinburgh, New York, Adelaide, Sydney and most recently to the Kennedy Center, Washington in May 2016. The same team produced *Lessness* by Samuel Beckett, also starring Olwen Fouéré, which premiered in London at the Barbican's International Beckett Season in 2015.

Alongside its producing role the Festival has also presented the work of seminal artists in recent years across the artforms including Joni Mitchell, Bill Viola, The National, Grizzly Bear, Bon Iver, St. Vincent, John Grant, John Gerrard, Hughie O'Donoghue, Sophie Calle, Louise Bourgeois, Cormac McCarthy, Brett Bailey, David Hockney, Kronos Quartet, Philip Glass, Fabulous Beast Dance Theatre, Michael Clark, Hofesh Shechter, Stephen Petronio, Steppenwolf, Royal Court, New York Theatre Workshop, and Australia's Circa, and works regularly with leading Irish companies including Druid.

The Festival is led by Chief Executive John Crumlish, Artistic Director Paul Fahy, Financial Controller Gerry Cleary, Administrator Elizabeth Duffy and Communications & Development Manager Hilary Martyn.

Jim Culleton | Direction

Jim Culleton is the Artistic Director of Fishamble: The New Play Company for which he has directed productions on tour throughout Ireland, UK, Europe, Australia and the US, winning Olivier, Fringe First, Herald Angel, Argus Angel, The Stage, 1st Irish, and Irish Times Theatre awards. Recent productions for Fishamble include INSIDE THE GPO by Colin Murphy (staged in the GPO for Easter 2016), TINY PLAYS FOR IRELAND AND AMERICA (Kennedy Center, Washington DC, and Irish Arts Center, New York, for Ireland 100), SPINNING by Deirdre Kinahan (Dublin Theatre Festival), LITTLE THING, BIG THING by Donal O'Kelly (touring in Ireland, UK, Europe, US. Australia) and FORGOTTEN. SILENT and UNDERNEATH by Pat Kinevane (touring to over 60 Irish venues and 17 other countries).

David Bolger is the Artistic Director of CoisCéim Dance Theatre. He has directed and choreographed original works for the company, which have toured throughout Ireland, UK, Europe, Australia, China and USA, winning many prestigious awards for innovation, performance and choreography. Recent productions include SWIMMING WITH MY MOTHER, AGNES, and THE WOLF AND PETER. His work for film includes the multi-award winning HIT AND RUN, DEEP END DANCE and DANCING AT LUGNASA. David has work with many theatre companies including: Druid Theatre Company, The Abbey Theatre, National Theatre (London), The Royal Opera House and English National Opera. Recently David created the choreography for RTÉ's CENTENARY show at Bord Gais Energy theatre. His next project THESE ROOMS is collaboration with ANU Theatre Company and will premiere in Dublin in September 2016.



Kate Ellis | Musical Direction, Performer

Kate is a versatile musician dedicated to the performance and exploration of all new music. She is cellist and Artistic Director of Crash Ensemble and a member of the Taquin experiments, Yurodny and electro-folk group Fovea Hex. 


Sinéad McKenna | Lighting Design




EILEEN GRAY

1878	Born Kathleen Eileen Moray Smith near Enniscorthy, Co Wexford. Spends her youth between family homes in Enniscorthy and London, with frequent travels in Europe.
1900	Brother Lonsdale is killed in the Boer War. Father dies shortly after. Travels to Paris for the first & enrols in the Slade School of Fine Art in London.
1901	
1901	Begins studying lacquer technique with D. Charles in his shop in London. Moves to Paris and studies at the Académie Julian.
1902	Returns to London to be with her mother. Resumes lacquerwork with D Charles, and
1903	studies at Slade.
1906	Returns definitively to Paris.
1907	Purchases a flat at 21 Rue Bonaparte, which she will own her entire life.
	Begins working in collaboration with Japanese lacquer specialist Seizo Sugawara.
1909	Buys first car, and takes an interest in aviation.
1910	Opens a weaving workshop with Evelyn Wyld, & lacquer workshop with Sugawara.
1913	Exhibits in Paris leading to commission from collector Jacques Doucet.
1915	Exhibits in San Fransisco. Drives an ambulance in Paris during the war.
	Opens a workshop in London with Sugawara. Brother James is killed in the war.
1917	Returns to Paris. English Vogue lauds her work.
1918	Mother dies.
1921	Buys small house in Samois-sur-Seine. Entertains friends here, including Damia, the singer/artist.
1922	Opens Galerie Jean Desert in Paris. Begins to work with Jean Badovici who encourages her towards architecture.
1926	Begins work on a vacation house in France for Badovici which will become E1027.
1929	Founding member of the Union des Artiste Modernes (UAM).
1930	Definitively closes Galerie Jean Désert and the lacquer workshop.
1940	As a foreigner during wartime, is forced to leave her home.
1945	Returns to Paris, and a looted home.
1968	Is the subject of an article in architecture and design journal Domus, which brings work to light again.
1972	Is named Royal Designer for Industry by the British Society for the Arts.
1973	Is made an honorary member of the Royal Institute of Irish Architects.
	A retrospective exhibition entitled <i>'Eileen Gray. Pioneer of Design'</i> is held at the Royal Institute of British Architects in London.
1976	Dies in her Paris apartment on 31 October at the age of 98.
