














COISCÉIM DANCE THEATRE

CoisCéim has earned a reputation for creating and presenting original dance theatre for stage, off-site and on film. Led by Artistic Director David Bolger, CoisCéim tours throughout Ireland and has developed an international reputation at prestigious festivals such as the Venice Biennale (2007); Edinburgh Fringe Festival (2005 & 2006); China Ireland Festival in Beijing & Shanghai (2004); the Jacob's Pillow Festival, USA (2001) and the 10 Days on the Island Festival in Tasmania (2000).

CoisCéim has received many awards including two Edinburgh Fringe Firsts and is widely acclaimed for its "exhilarating...astounding performances" (*The Guardian*).

Under the umbrella of CoisCéim Broadreach, over three thousand people of all ages have been introduced to dance. In addition to classes, workshops and programmes for older people, CoisCéim Broadreach co-ordinates a youth dance theatre group Creative Steps and also initiates projects with various communities of place, age or interest. CoisCéim Broadreach and Dublin City Council's Arts, Sport & Leisure and Community Development Sections are delighted to come together for the fourth year to produce a dance project for people aged 50+ as part of Bealtaine Festival.

In five venues throughout Dublin City, over 300 people joined drop-in dance classes in February and March this year. By April, a dedicated performance group of 40 dancers emerged to create a dance homage to films of the silent era.

The performance today is the culmination of five weeks of creative rehearsal sessions and demonstrates the wealth of creativity and passion for dance among our older aged citizens. Together we danced, improvised and created new choreography. Throughout this process participants stretched and flexed, twisted and turned — working incredibly hard to perfect dance sequences, develop characters and build the performance of Silent Idols. Along the way there has been much laughter and hilarity not to mention a few strong words and sore feet! Yet inspired by the iconic artists and films of the silent era, we have all been moved 'to push the boat out', as this year's theme of Bealtaine suggests.

I would like to extend my thanks to all the production team and organisers for their support and generous help on this project. Finally, special thanks is due to the performers, for without their energy and commitment, willingness to try something different, sense of humour - and of course passion for dance Silent Idols would not have been possible.
